Citations for outstanding contributions to student learning

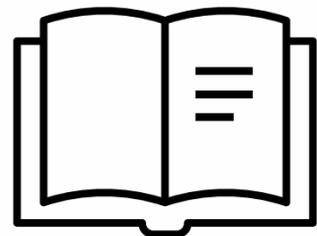
Outstanding contributions are:

- Significant—has tangible impact on student learning
- Leading—go beyond normal design, delivery or support
- Evidencebased—can demonstrate achievement
- Purposeful and reflective—describe a cohesive narrative

Selecting the right subcategory cont.



1. **Approaches** to teaching and/or the support of learning that influence, motivate and inspire students to learn

Consider:

Teaching philosophy
Integrating, cohesive
Enabling success

2. Development of **curricula, resources or services** that reflect a command of the field

Consider:

Development of discipline education
New types of resources
New applications of resources
Authentic tasks
Linkage to practice/life/community

Selecting the right subcategory cont.



3. Effective **assessment practices** that bring about improvements in student teaching, focus on academic integrity.

Consider:

Authentic Assessment
Feedback
Academic integrity
Evaluative judgement

4. **Innovation or leadership** that has influenced and enhanced learning and teaching and/or the student experience.

Consider:

Sphere of influence

- *Institution: own and others*
- *Discipline, peak bodies*
- *Sector: national, international*

Different kinds of leadership

Addressing all the assessment criteria



Impact

Positively impacted on student learning, student engagement or the overall student experience for a period of no less than three years

Recognition

Gained recognition from colleagues, the institution, and/or the broader community

Creativity

Shown creativity, imagination and/or innovation

Scholarship

Drawn on the scholarly literature on teaching and learning to inform the development of initiatives, programs and/or practices

Building the narrative

Start early - very early! Make sure you have a plan for your initiatives, and that you can justify and evaluate them.

*Seek **mentoring** from a colleague who is experienced as an AAUT assessor or reach out to one of the mentors listed on the AAUT website*

Share your practice outside your discipline – national and international sharing is needed

Evidence cont.



- Critique your data - and/or ask a friend
- Triangulate with complementary data
- Show sustained with longitudinal data
- Qualitative and/or quantitative
- Context – constraints, factors
- Literature – alignment/new insight

Examples of good forms of evidence

In 2013, I was very grateful to receive a [redacted] University Postgraduate Students' Association Online Teacher of the Year Award. Of my five [redacted] teaching awards, this is the most treasured because it was student-nominated. It was a turning point for my teaching – I became motivated to invest in evidence-based evaluation, applying Brookfield's (1995) advice around multiple evidence points. I used feedback from esteemed teachers by participating in a national, multi-institutional trial of a Peer Assisted Teaching Scheme. This really helped me adapt my course delivery without reducing the student experience as student numbers increased from 12 to 60. I also used Brookfield's Critical Incident Questionnaire (CIQ, 1995) as a lens into students' experiences. I shared my reflections on what I 'heard' with students and adjusted my own teaching transparently and publicly in response. I used a reflective journal assignment as a second 'window' on student experience (Wals, 2014).

'At first I was very reluctant to do this ... quite overwhelming. However ... I realised it was a great way to really think about everything I had learnt in the course and how that relates to my career' (student survey, 2014).

Another survey evaluated the ten stages of transformative learning (Mezirow, 1991). My data showed all my students went through one stage of transformational learning, and 73% went through 5+ (CV refs 26 & 27). Standardised university Student Feedback on Courses (SFC, /5), show student satisfaction consistently improved over 8 years (Figure 1).

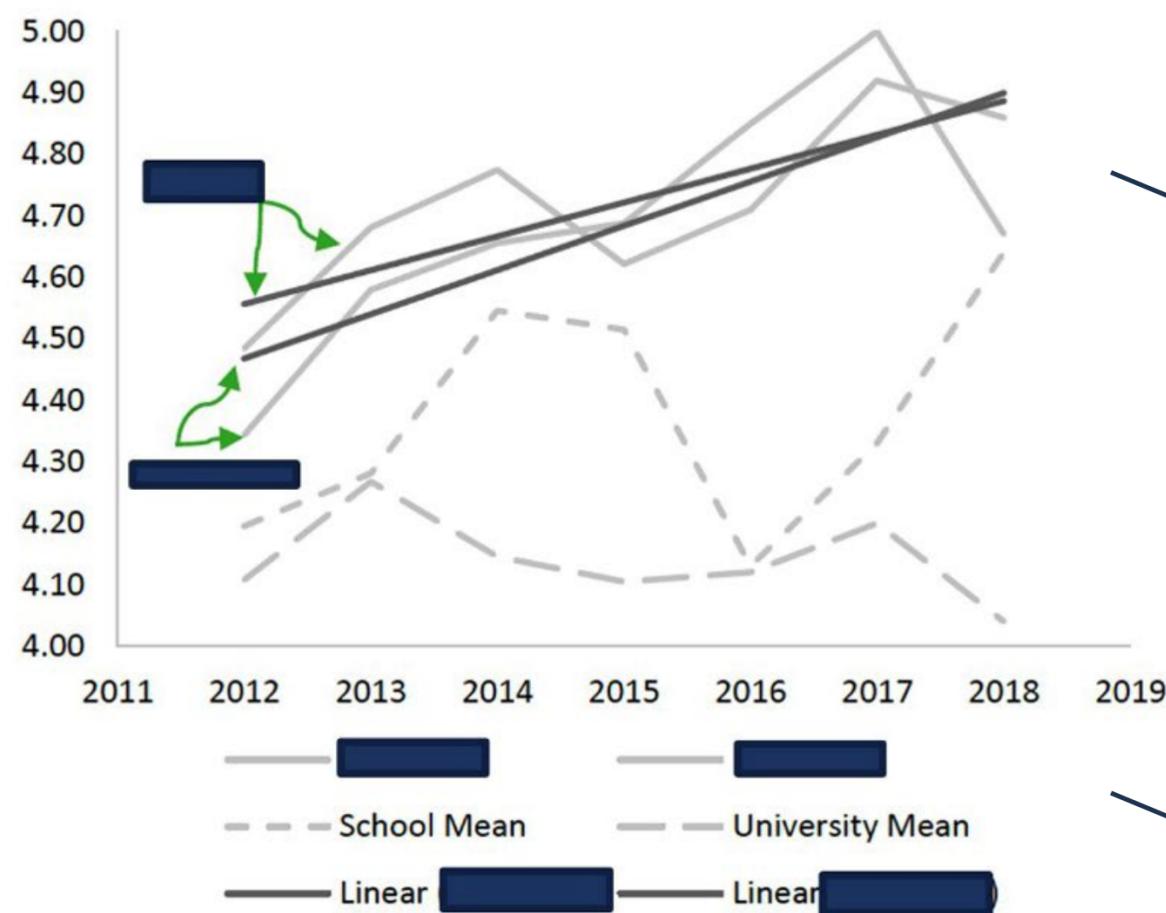

After discussing an idea within a course, one student founded and became the Managing Director of 'xxxx Sustainable Living', winning the xxxx Australian Association of Environmental Education xxxx Environmental Community Educator of the Year Award.

Another integrated her coursework learning into her role managing urban cooling for xxxx City Council, winning both a Council 'Shine' Award in 2016 for her Action Plan and the xxxx Government's Premier's Sustainability Award...

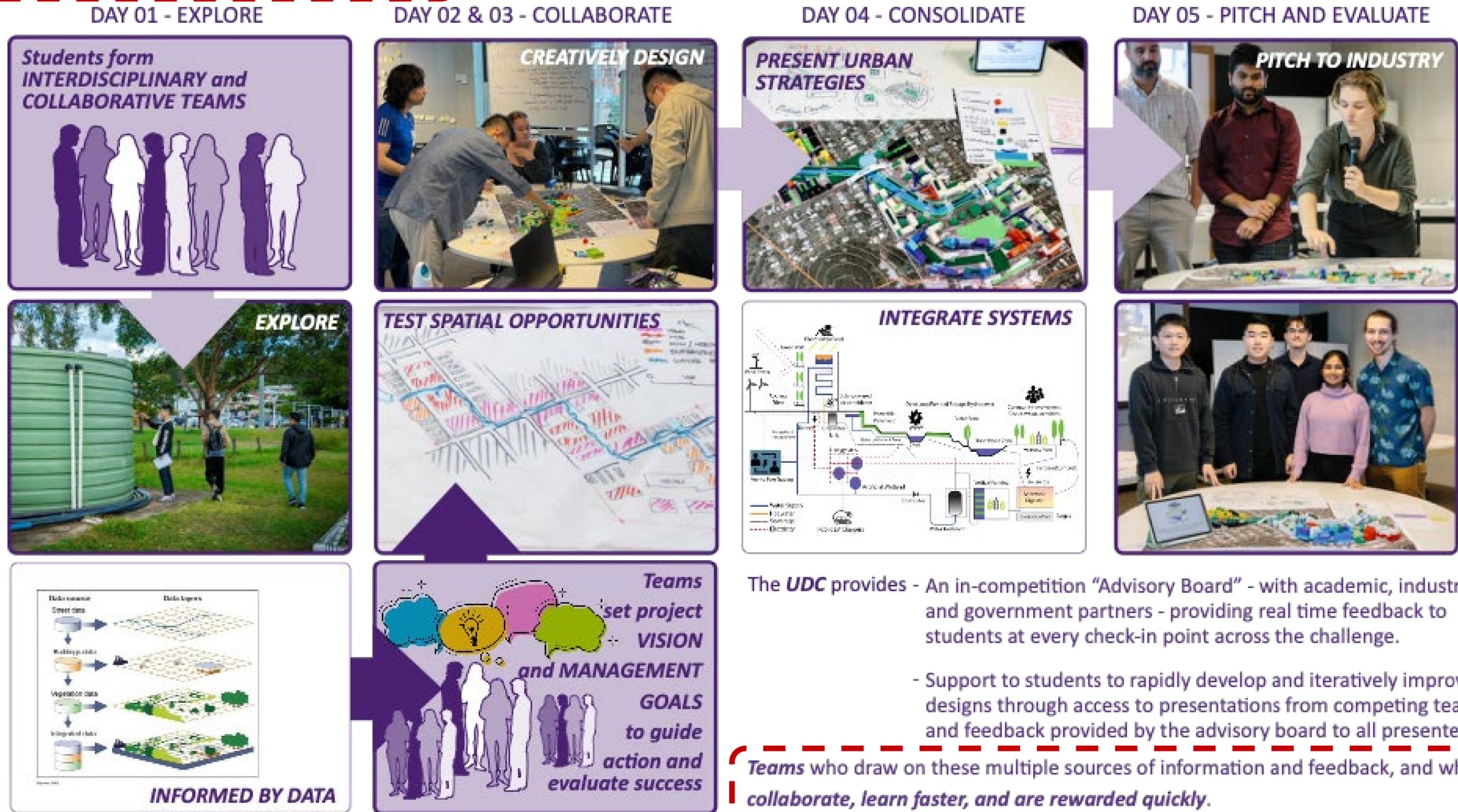

The Urban Design Challenge- what's involved?

Key innovation:

- Five days “play-based” working on a wicked problem to solve in a fun (but stressful) situation.
- Scaffold the teamwork.

SUSTAINED GAMIFICATION **REAL-TIME MULTI-CHANNEL FEEDBACK**



Teams who draw on these multiple sources of information and feedback, and who collaborate, learn faster, and are rewarded quickly.

Real-time multi-channel feedback: High resolution and open.

Developing the Nomination:

Our experience and AAUT/AAUTN resources.

- Our 2022 UQ application, and Australian Financial Review 2023 application helped hugely, as did input from ITaLI (Institute for Teaching and Learning Innovation).
- Communicating “what the Challenge is” was very hard...needed multiple iterations...and is not yet complete. The constrained word limits forced visual communication which improved what we could share dramatically.
- Was very helpful to have surveyed students (before and after the UDC) twice.
- Reviews helped lift from our discipline-based framing to bring out the underpinning education theories and frameworks.
- Teamwork was essential....required multi-disciplinary team.

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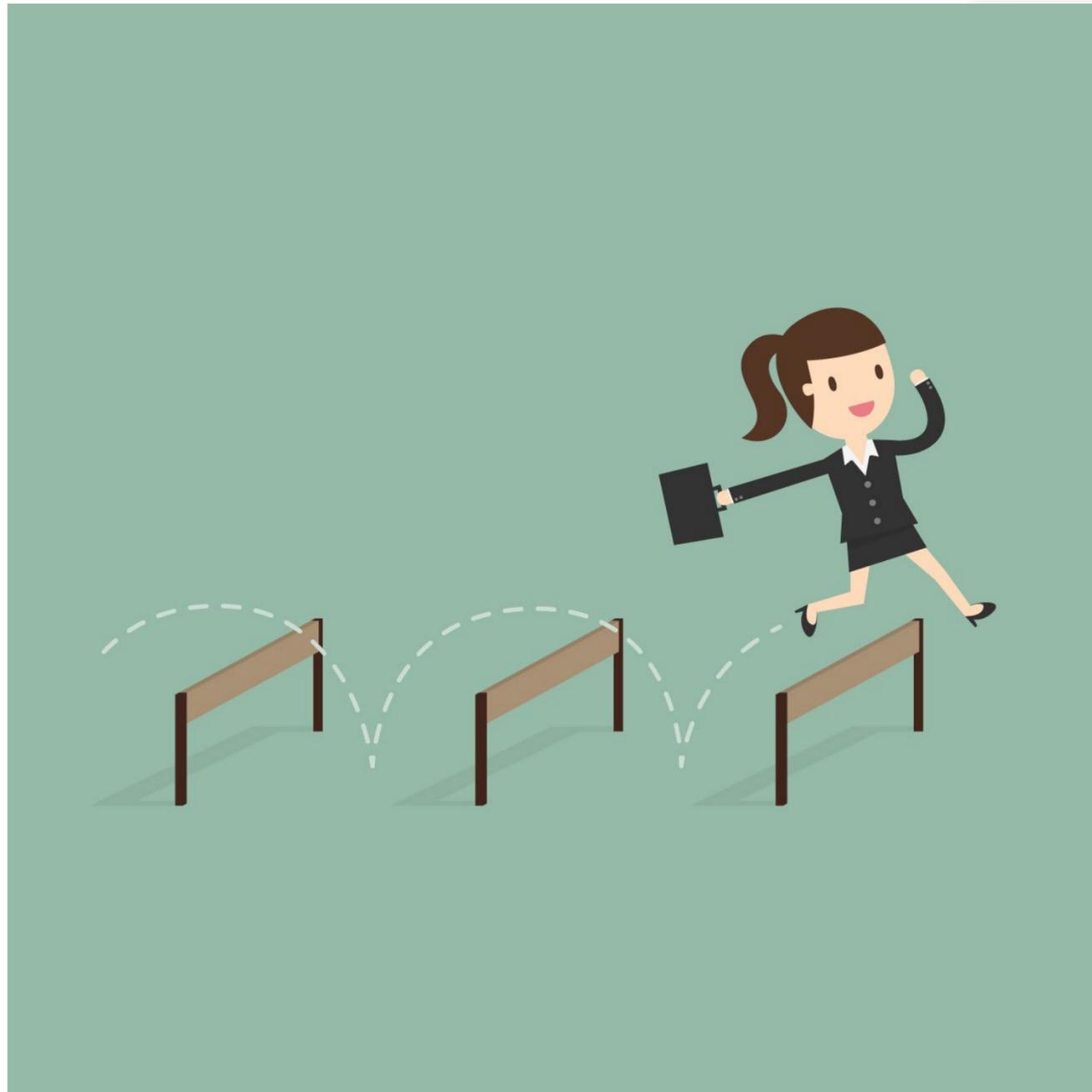

Experience writing the nomination



- Make statements, writing a rough draft
- Answer the questions of Why/What/How
- Collect evidence from a variety of stakeholders (over the years)
- Weave a story and add it under the correct headings
- Watch all the YouTube resources on writing the application
- Get it reviewed by multiple people
- Finalise it at least five days before the deadline and read it once every day until the application date.
