What are the Early Career Awards?



- Nominees can apply for the 'Early Career' award category as part of:
 - Citations for Outstanding Contribution to Student Learning
 - Awards for Teaching Excellence

Eligibility:

- Nominees with **no more than five years' experience in teaching in higher education** institutions may apply for an Early Career Award. That is, from the starting date of teaching to the date of submission, i.e. August 2019 to August 2024.
- Interruptions for unemployment, parental leave or medical conditions are not included in this calculation.
- Early Career nominees must provide evidence that they positively impacted on student learning, student engagement or the overall student experience for a period of no less than two years, not including time taken for development or trial of any activity.



THE EARLY-CAREER JOURNEY...

What do assessors look for in an Early Career nomination?



- Evidence from (at least) the last 2 years (up to ~5 years teaching experience allowed).
- It is different to the Citation for outstanding contribution to student learning
 - Far more "overall", with more criteria and metrics to meet.
 - Student learning still sits as the priority.
- Show that the presented practices actually assist students
 - i.e. you run a podcast, you have a popular site on social media, etc. Does this actually help your students in this field?
- How does your excellent teaching make you stand out?
 - Every applicant is supported by their Dean & University. Most applicants will have great Teaching Evaluations. What do <u>you</u> do that is different?

Seeing the Big Picture



- Be careful highlighting endeavours that might show you've gone a bit rogue. These may be great, and fun for students, but are they backed by any evidence?
- Drawing on scholarly literature, and/or doing your own research into the impact of any interventions greatly assists.
- Care with words like "engaged", "effective" or "enhanced learning" this is a measurable metric and should be supported with evidence
- Consider if some of the interventions you promote are simply activities you should be doing anyway as a routine part of your job (tweaking assessment criteria in response to student feedback, updating course content each year, etc)

Tips for Addressing the Criteria



Alongside teaching evaluations and obvious metrics, consider alternative types of evidence:

- Live class attendance (online, face-to-face)
- Interactions with your online platform
- 'Views' or 'clicks' on articles, submissions, content (not just article citations)
- Peer review feedback, and practice
- Solving community problems (information overload, critical thinking, etc)
- Graduate feedback
- Broad range of students (or staff) who have benefited
- Effective stewardship of grant or award money into teaching
- Benefits beyond the institution
- Who else is following your example?
- How long into the future will these interventions maintain benefits?
- Ability to effectively adapt due to COVID changes, government regulations (i.e. international student issues), professional body accreditation updates.

It can take a very, very long time to write, so think of how you can gain benefit from the process, whether you win the award or not

- Collecting evidence for your CV
- Using evaluation strategies to enhance class teaching
- Reflecting upon practice



Experience writing the nomination



STORYTELLER: Have a clear story to tell and take your reader on the journey. Assume no knowledge by reader.

WHAT/IMPACT/RECOGNITION: if you can't articulate reconsider your story.

ADDRESS THE CRITERIA: make sure you understand what assessors are looking for and make it easy to find.

EVIDENCE: Proof of impact is vital, get creative, looks for ways to support your story. It's a long process so continue to gather evidence to support your work, this may include actively sourcing feedback.

IMPACT: Advocating your philosophies and work with the broader academic team to try and help uplift entire discipline is motivating and helps strengthen your application.

REFLECTION: Reflecting on your work is a wonderful experience, and you learn so much when you sit down and reflect on your practice and articulate why you do what you do, and how to do it better.

Managing the Air Traffic Environment





Context

Managing the Air Traffic Environment introduces students to the major players in the global air transport system. Air traffic Management (ATM) provides the connecting infrastructure that allows aircraft to fly safely between airports. The course explores the effects of weather, in flight emergencies, aeronautical publications, airspace management across Air Navigation Service providers and the cultural aspects of safety in such an environment.




SELLING SUCCESS: something that I am not very comfortable

QUESTION: So what??




Tips & Advice for future nominees
