The nomination link will be sent to each Vice-Chancellor in late October 2025.





# **Share your AAUT story - A/Professor Christian Moro, Bond University**



It was an absolute honour to have received the AAUT Teaching Excellence award in 2018, after taking quite the journey to get there! The award's requirement to gather evidence for teaching excellence was one of the first times that I really stopped to critically evaluate my teaching practices - *Did that intervention actually work? How did those portions of my revised curriculum enhance learning?; In what ways did the students really benefit?* Answering these questions required taking a step back, and examining where, and if, I had truly helped students on their educational journeys with my teaching. This also required me to consider whether some of the unique teaching approaches introduced were simply because I'd wanted to (always a temptation!), or whether they had been grounded in theory, evidence, and best practice.

The first year that I was nominated for the award, rapidly identified that I didn't have the necessary evaluation skills fully evolved yet, and chose not to apply. Attending workshops, training sessions, reading literature, and more helped upskill various teacher reflection abilities and contributed to the development of critical evaluation strategies. It meant that the next time I was nominated, felt more prepared and did submit the application form. Importantly, this was not the end of it. The developed skills from the application process, and ability to: critically appraise my teaching practices; evaluate student feedback; and pivot my practices to accommodate student learning; were all stimulated by working through the initial application and remain proficiencies that I still employ to this day. This is why I highly recommend all academics consider applying for one of the AAUT awards. It's not just the award itself, but the process, and the chance to develop new skills as part of the process. Skills that you will carry alongside you and that will be of benefit throughout the rest of your academic teaching career.

# Get to know Program Award Recipient: STEM WIL Program

Flinders University's STEM Work Integrated Learning (WIL) program is nationally recognised for exceptional graduate employability, student learning, and satisfaction rates, outperforming trends despite being a smaller South Australian university. This program offers students up to 100 days of industry placement—the longest undergraduate core placement in Australia—and has grown from 20 to over 300 students across all STEM disciplines, including non-traditional areas like mathematics. Commended as a national gold standard and recipient of awards and international recognition, Flinders' WIL program sets the benchmark for best practice and is led by a dedicated team supporting both industry partners and students.
